But I remember these words from Joshua 23:6 "Be very strong; be careful to obey all that is written in the Book of the Law of Moses, without turning aside to the right or to the left."

Joshua had served as the leader of Israel since the death of Moses. He had led Israel across the Jordan River into the Promised Land, throughout the early stages of the conquest. He had led the process of assigning the tribes of Israel their inheritance in the land, appointed cities of refuge and cities for the Levites.

But at this point in his story, he was stepping down from leadership and passing that mantle on to younger leaders. He was selecting his final words to the people of Israel. And his words were: Be strong and obey the Lord.

Now, I am no Joshua and we all have a way to go to reach the Promised Land. But I think his words to Israel are appropriate for me to quote and for you to hear. Be strong. Obey everything that Jesus taught us (see Mt 28:20).

Our starting place is always the same: we want to follow Jesus in every part of our lives. This is not an abstract command. It does not speak about an emotional feeling of surrender. It is the deliberate, careful and determined daily decision to put Jesus' words and example into practice. Jesus commanded the church in Matthew 28:20 to teach disciples to "obey everything I have commanded you." He really meant that.

Understanding Jesus' commands is not the hard part. Putting them into practice is. We'd rather not. We'd rather do what we want. That is the natural consequence of the fall. It is the outgrowth of our sin-nature. Don't be surprised by your own natural resistance to doing what Jesus commanded.

That is why Joshua's first words are so important. BE STRONG. It takes strength of character, and the daily decision to live as a disciple to put Jesus' words into action. This isn't stubbornness. It is surrender to Christ demonstrated by the will to do what Jesus said.

I know the bishop has appointed a wonderful pastor to serve Grace. While it is hard to say goodbye, that is much easier knowing your pastor. Perhaps it is hard for you to say goodbye to Melanie and me. Remember, there is much more God wants to do in and through you.

So be strong. Obey. And be blessed. — Pastor Byron

Most of us go to church, hear about missions around the world, agree that the people whom the churches send out are doing a wonderful job. We give our money to support the radio stations, salaries for those who are witnessing, and to buy Bibles to be given out. Then we get on with our everyday, very safe, lives.

Recently I read a first-person account written by a college student who was asked by her roommate if she would like to join her on a tour of China. Only after they were there was she told that the trip was to sneak Bibles across the Chinese border! If caught, this could mean a life in prison After much prayer, she agreed to do it. The article describes how scared she was. As she stood in line to show her passport, one guard never took his eyes off her. She was sure that he suspected she was smuggling. She had a big decision to make: stay in line and hope she was wrong or try to get over into the other line and chance that he would come after her.

The next few paragraphs are in her words.

"God, I whispered, I leave my life in Your hands."

When I looked up, a handsome young Chinese man dressed in business attire was approaching my side. He gently touched my elbow, asked for my passport and gestured for me to follow him. He escorted me directly to the head of a different line that was adjacent to the line in front of the angry guard. Panic rose up in my spirit. Who is this man? Why had I just given him my passport?

These erratic thoughts pummeled my fist like a prize fighter landing fists for the knockout blow. I was now at the mercy of an angry guard and an unknown stranger. Slamming my passport on the table directly in front of the border guard, my escort declared, "Your line is too slow! You are taking too much time! This girl is traveling with me and my tour is getting later by the minute." He pointed to the large group of people standing on the other side of the border who were looking back at us as if waiting for him to return. "You must stamp her passport immediately and get going or I will report you!" The guard indignantly stamped my passport, muttered his disapproval, and motioned for us to pass through.

Could it be that easy? I quickly hurried behind my newfound friend but stopped for a moment to make sure I had all my bags. When I looked up, to my astonishment, my hero had disappeared. I searched every direction to see if I could fin him, but he had vanished. No sight of him or any of the tourists who were following him.

Could it be ... was he ... an angel? Was this a miracle like the miracles I had heard about and read about in the Bible?

I gathered my thoughts and searched for my traveling companion We boarded the train and settled in our seats. As we neared our destination we sunk low in our seats and transferred the Bibless from our back packs into carry-on luggage that we held between our knees. We had been told that a young college age student would approach us and offer his assistance once we arrived at the station. We were to hand over our luggage filled with Bibles.

As we stepped off the train we were engulfed in a sea of humanity. Hundreds of people rushed past us to board trains.
